Masalin was pronounced dead at Bottsful General Hospital, Farmington Hills, after he was discovered in the bedroom of his one-bedroom apartment. The autopsy was per-

One of Masalin's neighbors con-tacted the apartment's management, who called 911, said deputy fire Chile Peter Baldwin.

The fire at about 12.45 p.m., Wednesday, was believed to have started with an accelerant of some type. It was conflined to the living room and kitchen of the apartment. This was the first fatal fire in Farm-ington Hills in many years.

WHEN FIREFIGHTERS arrived at the apartment the fire had al-ready extinguished itself, preventing further damage or injuries in the apartment complex on the cast side of Middlebelt, between 9 and 10 Mile roads.

Furniture and carpeting in the apartment were burned and the
