Often likened to the Eagle Scout rank of their male counterparts, the girl scout cadette first class award culminates several years of earnest effort and achievements and is awarded to the girl who successfully completes four required challenges: emergency preparedness, active citizenship, social dependency.

The fourth-most difficult-is the challenge of the promise and the laws.

While the first three challenges tested a girl's knowledge and skill, this challenge catches the girl's heart and mind to discover if she has been able to apply the Girl Scout promise and laws to everything she does.

In the first challenges, girls work in small groups to prepare for and meet challenges set forth by their leader.

In the promise and the laws, each girl meets this challenge alone.

An evaluation by a panel of her peers determines whether she makes the grade.

FOUR MORNING seminars with the theme "Champs Go Round" will open the day-long event that will also feature a luncheon and fashion show.

A nostalgic note to the fashion parade will come with the showing of scout uniforms of by-gone days. Cadettes will be models.

Seminars focusing on hair care, cosmetics, fashion and good grooming will be conducted by Montgomery-Ward Fashion coordinator and commentator will be Ward's Loretta Lorian.

In addition, the Scout Senior Planning Board will hold a fifth seminar to acquaint the Cadettes with the opportunities available to them as Senior Scouts.
