

Farmington gets victory

Scott Frump was first in two events and helped Farmington win the 200-yard medley relay Thursday, leading the Falcons to a 112-68 victory over host Livonia Churchill in boys swimming.

Farmington is 2-1 in dual meets. The contest was postponed from Tuesday, Jan. 14, because of snow. Frump swam the 50 freestyle in 23.92 and the backstroke in 1:00.21. He also started the relay and was followed by Jeff James, Steve Scanto and Scott Brown. The Falcons finished in 1:50.6.

Farmington's Mark Scant won the butterfly in 1:02.49 and combined with Don Boyer, Dave Kandi and Steve Scanto to win the 200 freestyle relay in 1:39.55.

Brown also anchored the 400 freestyle relay.

Shamrocks whip Churchill

It should be understood that, as coach Pete Leonhardt put it, his Redford Catholic Central swim team was "swimming real tired right now." It meant the Shamrocks were in the midst of heavy training and weren't resting for dual meets.

The situation was the same for Livonia Churchill, which hosted CC Tuesday. Still, getting the Chargers rested in 200 for the meet probably wouldn't have made a whole lot of difference.

"When you're matched up against a top-10 team, it's tough to do what you want to do," said coach Ken Stark after his Churchill team absorbed a 125-38 loss.

CC won nine events, with James Leslie and Randy Teeters each col-

lecting two individual firsts and swimming on two winning relays. The dual-meet victory lifted CC's record to 3-1; the Shamrocks are ranked fifth in Class A. Churchill slipped to 2-3 in dual meets.

THE SHAMROCKS' times weren't exceptional, but considering the rigorous training they've immersed in, Leonhardt said, "I'm real satisfied with the times we're getting. And I'm real pleased with the way the guys are coming through."

Leslie broke a Churchill pool record by winning the 100-yard backstroke in 55.50. He also finished first in the 200 individual

medley (2:05.22). Teeters won both the 50 freestyle (23.35) and 100 butterfly (57.00). The pair combined with Chris Teeters and Chris Meek for a first in the 200 medley relay (1:50.12) and with Steve Reinke and John Brogan for a win in the 400 free relay (3:28.52).

Other individual winners for CC were Reinke in the 200 free (1:52.05) and Brogan in the 100 free (52.39). Paul Magoulik, Meek, Brian Sosnowski and Kevin Markell combined for a first in the 200 free relay (1:37.65).

CHURCHILL GOT victories from Rob Moore in diving (232.70 points), Jon Carlson in the 500 free (5:15.75) and Jeff Danner in the 100 breaststroke (1:06.53). Carlson also swam his fastest time of the season in the 200 free — 1:56.1 — but finished fourth.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Jon Grant at 7:30 p.m. Members Present: Bates, Grant, Marks, Sever, Smith and Vagnoni. Members Absent: Lichtman. Others Present: City Manager Costick, City Clerk Dornan, Assistant City Manager Call, Assistant Board, Directors Coutegnan and Rosch, Planning Consultant Coates and City Attorney Donohue.

COUNCIL:

- Decried introduction of Zoning Text Amendment 11, 1991, to specify areas available for future IHO development.
- Postponed action on resolution urging reinstatement of the Michigan Air Quality Control Commission until February 10, 1992.
- Considered attendance at both the National League of Cities Annual Congressional City Conference and the 36th Annual Michigan Municipal League Legislative Conference.

ENACTED THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 30, TRAFFIC AND MOTOR VEHICLES, ARTICLE II, DIVISION 5:

- C-5-92, to add Section 30-316a to provide penalties for driving without a license and for impounding motor vehicles.
- C-6-92, repealing Section 30-319 through 30-327 and enacting new Sections 30-319 and 30-319a through 30-319h, prohibition against operating a vehicle while under the influence of alcoholic liquor or controlled substance with unlawful blood alcohol level, or while physically impaired.
- C-7-92, Section 30-328, to prohibit transporting or possession of open alcoholic liquor within a passenger compartment of a vehicle.

This ordinance was adopted at a regular meeting held on January 20, 1992, and ordered publication of the following summary of the Ordinance, in accordance with Section 4.04 of the City Charter. THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDAINS:

Section 1.
Chapter 30, Traffic and Motor Vehicles, Article II, Division 5, Sections 30-319 through 30-327 are repealed and in their place and stead are enacted Sections 30-319 and 30-319a thru h, which shall read as follows:
30-319. Operating under influence of alcoholic liquor or controlled substance; operating with unlawful blood alcohol content; operating while visibly impaired; attempts; penalties.
30-319a. Arrests; preliminary chemical breath analysis; chemical tests and analysis of blood, urine or breath - rights and consequences of refusal; use of chemical test results in civil or criminal proceeding; uniform rules for administration of chemical tests.
30-319b. Arraignment; pretrial conference; duty of court before accepting plea of guilty or nolo contendere; screening and assessment as to alcohol or drug abuse and rehabilitative services; license surrender and sanctions; issuance of restricted license.
30-319c. Implied consent to chemical tests; certain persons exempt from blood withdrawal.
30-319d. Refusal of chemical test - right of driver; report to secretary of state.
30-319e. Refusal to submit to chemical tests; notice of report; request for hearing; counsel.
30-319f. License action upon refusal to submit to chemical test; secretary of state hearing; appeal.
30-319g. Police confiscation of drivers license or permit; issuance of temporary license or permit; return of license or permit.
30-319h. Nolo contendere pleas.


