## Students simulate a trip to Olympics

ULTURE. HISTORY, physical fitness, travel and teamwork were all tessons learned this week as third-graders and kindergarteners at Wood Creek Elementary took a special simulated trip to the Winter Olympic games in France.

Third-graders from classes taught by Diane Frank and Vicki Shaw and kindergarteners from Gerrie Pugh's two classrooms participated in the events, which included learning about France and its culture, making needed items for the trip—such as pasports and luggage — and hosting a mini-Olympics for the school that included opening ceremonics, a simulated bobsied race and a biathalon.

Physical education teacher Linda Perkins told

students the Olympies are a symbol of "peace, brotherhood and friendship" and "excellence in performance" by the athletes.

The precursor to modern Olympie Games were games in Athens in 1996 with several hardred athletes, principal Barbara Novasti stold students. Today, she said, about 10,000 athletes participate in the world athlete competition, which was organized in 1924.

PUGH CONSIDERS the cultural awareness part of the project important because, she said, it offers students a chance to look at various coun-

tries around the world.
"It's a Small World" was sung by the students

the sky as a message of world peace. Third-graders will perform a play of the same name in February.

Prior to the start of the Wood Creek games, third-graders researched and taught kindergar-teners about France and the Olympies. They pre-pared scenery, flags of participating countries, and a plane area complete with a ceekpit, a mov-ie and snacks for the trip. They also helped kin-dergarteners write a postcard home:.

Both grade levels learned about other coun-tries as well.

After the Olympic games were held, the stu-dents were scheduled to enjoy a French cafe, complete with French food, poetry, painters and sildes of France.
