Year-round plan will offer choice for Gill students

A "school-within-a-school" pro-gram will be ploted at Gill Elemen-tary this fall, offering students and parents there a choice between a traditional school schedule and one which operates throughout the year. The one-year pilot for the year round program was unaimously ap-proved by the Parmington school board Tuessky. Also approved was the biring of an elementary level ad unhistrative intern to help with that program and at other overcrewide School.

schools. School administrator Mary Lou-Somerville chaired the study com-mittee on year-round education dur-ing the past year. She said board ap-proval is the first step and that the district must now approach the Gill community to see who would be in-terested. If more students are need-

ed to fill slots, the district will offer the program to students at over-crowded elementaries. Although the district is consider-ing a "45-15" program – 45 days in school and 15 days off – the sched-ule has yet to be finalized, she said.

The different scheduling will allow students to re-tain information better, and also of-fers families different times of year for enrichment activities, such as vacations and visits to museums, he said.
