Damage to a room at Motel 6, 38309 Grand River, was estimated at more than \$900 Jan. 24-25. Items such as the TV, lamp, air conditioner, mirror, floor lamp, shower curtain, rod and wallpaper were damaged.  
Two offices on 12 Mile Road were damaged when someone tried to break into them, Jan. 25-27. Damage was estimated at \$500 at one of the offices where a door was broken and a wall punctured. At the second office, a briefcase and door received an estimated \$325 damage.
