The grand jury voted to indict Kevorkian Monday, after hearing four days of testimony in January in the deaths of Miller and Wantz. Kevorkian was arcreated without incident Wednesday and stood mute when arraigned on two counts of murder and one count of delivering a controlled substance. Circuit Judge Richard D. Kuhn set bond at 55,000 on esch charge. The physicalan was released after posting bond.

alleged the prosecutor was filling charges based on his own personal moral convictions rather than exist-ing law. Fieger predicted his client would be acquitted, just as he was found in nocent of murder charges in the first assisted suicide case involving Janet Atkins. Adkins.

Adkins, Kevorkian is scheduled for pre-liminary examination at 1:15 p.m. Tuesday in District Court 52-III in Rochester Hills. Rochester Hills. Fleger claims — and at least one district court judge, Gerald McNally of Clarkston, agreed — Michigan has no law àgainst assisted suicide. Thus, he claims, Kevorkian is within his

rights, and the law, to assist chroni-cally ill patients to end their own lives. McNally was one of 10 wilnesses to testify about Kevorkian before the grand jury. Thompion staid. McNah-ly's testimony was important be-cause it included the tegar rationale for this dismissing murder charges gainst Kevorkian in the June 1900, assisted suicide of Janet Adkins, the 34-year-old Alzheimer's disease vic-tim from Portland, Ore.

AT THE TIME, Thompson said he disagreed with McNally's dismissal, although he would not appeal it to the higher courts. Instead, he called
