Plans are taking shape for the area's 125th Anniversary Celebration, which commemorates Parmington's incorporation as a village in May.

Twenty five civic groups and businesses representing more than 100 volunteers have already signed up to sponsor activities and events for the celebration, which officially kicks off in May and will run through the fail. The communitywide festivities will include a presentation of a commemorative heritage quilt — currently being pieced together by volunteers— to Farmington City Council members in period costumes, an "166" Day" at the Community Center and a Family Day in the Park, among many other things.

City councilwoman Shirley Richardson, who is chairing the overall celebration, said there is an "aggressive schedule" for the coming year which should offer something for everyone.

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 May 6 Open houses will be held at Farmington City Hall and the downtown branch of the Farmington Community Library 1-5 p.m. A kick-off reception 5:30-7:30 p.m. at the Farmington Historical Museum will recognize living descendents from Farmington. Richardson said organizers have contacted about 50 descendents to date.

 May 16-23 Store window and poster displays done by Farmington area school students will be seen around town as recognition of the local anniversary and Michigan Weck.

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 May 31 "1867 Day" will be sponsored at the Community Center of Farmington/Farmington Hills. Hands-on demonstrations of quilting, weaving and other period crafting skills are scheduled.

 July 9.12 The Farmington/Farmington Hills Founders Festival will have "Farmington's 125th Anniversary" as It's theme for 1992.

 Aug. 22 Farmily Day in the Park will be held at Shiawassee Park 3-10 p.m. It will offer: games, crafts, minimum boat races, a chicken harbevue, a historic dance plan" in which a cow will wander on a designated, plotted area of land and "plop" on the vinning square.
