Serious crash ties up roads

Southbound traffic on Hunter between Maple and Hazel was blocked for nearly three hours Monday afternoon as a result of a serious car-truck collision.
Police Commander Richard Dimock said the accident occurred at about 11:45 a.m. at S. Hunter and Bowers when the driver of a 1987 Pontiac Bonneville ran a red light and was struck head-on by a 1988 Isuzu cargo van carrying bottled water.
The driver of the car, Mary Drapos, 63, of Birmingham was eastbound on Bowers when she was hit about halfway across Hunter.
Dimock said the three cargo van, driven by Richard Lewis, 28, of Redford Township tried to brake but hit the car and pushed it about 30 feet down the street.

Drapos was unconscious when she was taken to Wm. Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak. She was listed in good condition Tuesday.
Initially, Dimock said police thought that Drapos had died in the crash.
"We thought it was going to be a fatal," he said. Fatal crashes require more extensive investigations, Dimock said, which is why south Hunter was closed to traffic for so long.
"Fortunately, it was for naught. And we're happy about that," Dimock said.
No tickets have been issued yet, but the investigation is continuing, Dimock said.
Traffic in the area was tangled as police closed Hunter and rerouted drivers down Maple to S. Woodward. Gawkers in the northbound lanes slowed traffic in that direction.

NO OTHER VEHICLES were involved in the accident.
