

Swim ace has big day

It was just another meet for Livonia Stevenson's Bryan Morrison, but the senior demonstrated he ranks among the state's best freestylers.

He figured in three firsts Saturday and was part of a second-place relay squad in the annual Michigan Interscholastic Swim Coaches Invitational at Eastern Michigan University. Representatives from 50 schools participated in the meet.

The 6-foot-3 Morrison won the 200- and 500-yard freestyles with times of 1:44.4 and 4:48.61, respectively.

Leading off with a 48.43 split, Morrison also teamed up with junior George Gatewood, senior Aaron Hilderer and junior Mike Gravano to win the 400 freestyle relay.

"It's a meet you go to every year, it's more fun than anything else," said Morrison, who carries a 3.3 grade-point average while entertaining offers from Wisconsin, Michigan and Dartmouth.

Morrison currently rates third in Class A in the 200 freestyle and fifth in the 500 freestyle. His best clockings occurred earlier this year in Indianapolis where he won 1:43.8 in the 200 free and 4:44.0 in the 500 free.

"BRYAN IS a real worker, he's quiet, but leads by example," Stevenson coach Doug Ducker said. "We move him around in freestyle events, but he can do them all."

Not bad for a guy who took up swimming only six years ago after having his fill of baseball and basketball.

"I've been training harder this year," said Morrison, who finished eighth in the 500 free and ninth in the 200 free at last year's state meet. "I started with weights and I've been doing more yardage."

The Spartans also got a lot of yardage of several other performers at the MISA meet.

Hilderer added a third in the 200 individual medley and a seventh in the 100 backstroke, while Gatewood took a fourth in the 100 butterfly and fifth in the 200 1A.

Gecko finished second (1:00.33) behind Bedford Catholic Central's Handy Teeters in the 100 breaststroke.

TEETERS joined forces with senior John Drogan, senior Devon Fekete and junior Chris Meek to win the 200 medley relay (1:30.99), edging Stevenson's foursome of Morrison, Gatewood, George and Greg Priede (1:30.03).

CC also captured the 200 medley relay as sophomore James Leslie and Steve Leslie teamed up with Teeters and Drogan for a clocking of 1:30.6.

Leslie also added a second in the 100 backstroke and a fifth in the 200 freestyle. Both Stevenson and CC are ranked among the top 10 teams in Class A.

dividual champions — more than any other school.

"We knew Farmington would be the toughest team," Western coach Dick Watson said. The Warriors finished 5-1 in the WLLAA after suffering 39-20 loss to Farmington last week.

THE WARRIORS opened the finals with a flurry, winning two of the first three championships when brothers Rob (103) and Andy (112) Fritz won titles. Travis Ilacqua (145) won Western's other championship.

"Overall, I thought everyone wrestled well," Watson said. "We haven't been wrestling very well lately, but the kids rose to the occasion today. Everyone contributed."

The Spartans won the championship and improved to 30-1 on the season when he decided on Cantoni's Joe Hunter in the finals. Pace and Mancini were second while heavyweight Mark Bennett, Jim Simoneau (140) and Shane Hall (145) placed third.

Canton, Salem and North finished the tournament with two champions each.

Nick Spano of Canton flattened Northville's Dave Kovalovich in 2:40 to win the championship at 130. George Young, ranked third in the state by the high school coaches, won the title at 171 with a 7-3 decision over Farmington's Adams.

Scott Martin led Salem, winning the championship at 119 with a 6-0 decision over Western's Kim Wolfe.

Dan Bennett pinned Northville's Matt Allison at 1:35 of the 125-pound final.

North's Marcus Brown outpointed Livonia Franklin's Fred Vargas 5-1 to win the title at 140, and teammate Jeff Lawrence earned a 7-2 decision over Pallo to claim the crown at 160.
