

FCC revises technical standards

The first comprehensive revision of the FCC Technical Standards Rules, as it applies to performing cable television, in 20 years was voted in on Feb. 13. The FCC adopted the bulk of the Oct. 17, 1991 recommendations of a Joint Task Force on Technical Standards. (The National Cable Association, National Television Association, National League of Cities, United States Conference of Mayors, National Association of Counties, and National Association of Telecommunications Officers and Advisors were represented on the task force.)

After the vote the president of NAB, Susan Herman, said: "This vote represents the culmination of years of intensive work by cable regulators and the cable industry. Most important is that working together regulations and the cable operators have made the consumer the real winner. We're looking forward to the next phase of our joint project with the industry, as we work together to develop a standardized testing methodology manual."

Vic Gates of MetroVision Regional Office commented that "... This will be very positive to have a state of the art national standard." As the executive director of our cable franchise, I feel that "Partnering" of resources has become the essential ingredient to the strength toward public services. Our franchise has always cooperatively met with the cable industry — public — educational and governmental facilities, as we have developed cable offerings. Of course, we have not always agreed. However, we have always kept talking through committee work and continue to negotiate a
