• VERDICT IN It took a jury four hours to return a guilty verdict against a 31-year-old Farmington IIIIIs man charged with the use of a firearm during a drug traflicking crime and possession of an unrepistered matchine gun, ac-cording to US. Attorney Stephen Martin Allan Cook as found guilty of the charges Feb. 19 before US. District Julge Robert DeMascio in Detroit. Cook will be sentenced at a later date.

"The evidence presented at trial established that on June 15, 1909, po-lice officers from Livonia and South-field found cook in poassestion of a shorgun which Cook used to protect more than 75 grams of marijuana, which he intended to sell," said as-sistant U.S. Attorney Charles Hol-man. "When federal agents later at-tempted to arrest Cook on gun charges, they found him in poass-sion of a rifle along with the parts and Instructions on how to convert

the rifle into a machine gun." the rile into a machine gun." Cook faces a mandatory minimum sentence of five years for use of a firearms during a drug trafficking crime. Ite also faces an additional maximum penalty of up to 10 years and a fine of \$10,000, or both for the machine gun conviction, Holman said.
