

Bowlers could land on TV

YOU MAY SEE some of your friends, relatives or neighbors bowling on television in April.

WKBD-TV (Channel-50) will air the Valvoline Michigan Bowling Challenge each Saturday in April. This is a coordinated effort by the BCA, Channel-50 and the GDBA/DWBA, with Valvoline being the main sponsor.


To qualify for the show, all league bowlers were asked to pay a \$1 entry fee. League scores were based on the highest over average from each house, with the top man and woman qualifiers advancing to the regional roll-offs over the weekend.

The eight regional champions will then proceed to the televised competition on the one-hour program. If ratings for the show are high enough, there is a good chance Channel-50 will televise the show regularly in the fall.

A reminder to all secretaries:

Averages of all male bowlers with at least 21 games completed must be sent to the Greater Detroit Bowling Association displaying the bowler's average as of April 1 for the annual bowling yearbook.

The average appearing in the yearbook becomes the bowler's official average for this season — no matter what happens after time of publication.


