

# KIDS Hear About Sex

FARMINGTON All parents who support one or all three of the Family Life Education (FLE) programs of Farmington Public Schools, and who intend to support a moderate candidate for the Farmington Board of Education, are urged to attend the next meeting of the Committee for Knowledge, Involvement and Decisions (KIDS).

The meeting will be held at 8 p.m. Thursday, May 27, in the fellowship hall of the Farmington First Presbyterian Church at 11 Mile and Farmington Rd.

THE COMMITTEE FOR KIDS may May 17 to continue its function of informing Farmington residents about the FLE curriculum

programs and about 40 persons attended. Dr. Edwin Blumberg, a member of the FLE subcommittee on human sexuality, gave a condensed report on the human sexuality program which the board of education voted unanimously to implement last March. The sex education curriculum is part of the larger focus of family life and human relations, he said.

The basic approach in the program is to emphasize the relation between human beings, Dr. Blumberg said. "Sex" as such is actually played down. Sexuality is taught as growth and development of the human being in a way to help each person understand himself, or herself, and the opposite sex as a whole self.

"The aim is to help in-

dividuals develop as persons so that they can make responsible decisions about themselves.

While the school board assumes responsibility for all aspects of the human sexuality program, current parent participation is mandatory," Blumberg stressed.

"Parents who are willing to teach their children about sexuality are urged to remember the influence of the program and thus the need for school guidelines as well as home instruction."

The well-trained teacher is the core of the school's instruction on sexuality. In-service training on a continuous basis is the key to a successful program. In addition, screening of teachers and continuous review of the curriculum are planned."

CONTENT. Teaching materials, visual aids and concepts are gauged to the age level of the child, he continued.

"While opposition is worried about the ages at which certain concepts are to be taught, intercourse, as an example, would not be taught to eight-year-olds nor homosexuality to five-year-olds."

Formal discussion will be initiated by teachers at certain levels, he adds, but more important, teachers must be willing to answer children's questions when they are asked and always tell the truth.

"The rights of parents are carefully considered in the curriculum. It is hoped that parents will teach their own children and impart their values, but they have access to school materials if desired. They also have the right to withdraw their children from sex education classes if that is their decision."

One parent at the meeting said she believes her children will be enriched by additional sex education at school and that the school will support her own teaching. She added that children will not feel that they are alone in their problems when taught in groups at school.

THREE of the six candidates who have filed for the school board election June 14 to fill the vacancy of Chairman John Washburn III, who has resigned, were present at the meeting. They were David L. Kevelighan, Charles Weston and Dr. Marvin Ross. After giving background sketches of themselves, they responded to questions from the audience.

Questions centered on candidate support of FLE programs, such as: how to facilitate housing for minority teachers in Farmington if the minority understanding program is implemented; preference of the child as a criterion in selection of curriculum; child's freedom versus control; and attitudes toward textbook selection.

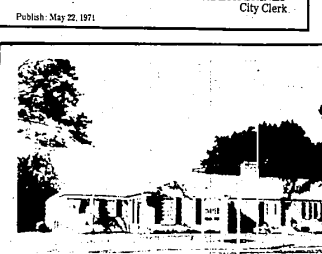
