

**Yearbook staff: We need money**

Selling candy to raise money has become such a headache in a Clarenceville High School Journalism class that students and teacher alike see a bleak future for the school's award-winning yearbook, "Trojan."

Eighteen students in Francis Skarvil's yearbook class also fear they're being cheated educationally as they devote more and more time to raising money to publish the yearbook and less time to learning journalistic skills.

"We are forced to spend our time selling M&Ms and do other things that have nothing to do with English or writing," Skarvil told the Clarenceville Board of Education Thursday.

"I don't want to spend time raising money during my teaching career,"

"Our class is so busy selling and fund raising that basic journalism skills are not being taught," said Mike Dunkles, 1992 co-editor. "We should spend our time working on journalism, not fund raising."

Students said that they are forced to cut corners, and the yearbook's quality, to pay publishing costs. Each year, they said, the book gets smaller, has fewer pages and less color.

The cutbacks are especially glaring to a school accustomed to winning national accolades year after year for the quality of its yearbook.

"It's one thing we are good at," said staffer Stacey Charbeau. "To cut it down more would only humiliate us."

THE STUDENTS also fear the yearbook will die if publishing it becomes an after-school activity.

Other kids on the staff are in athletics and other things," said staffer Jodie Graham. "There's not enough time for them to do everything."

If the yearbook doesn't get financial help, the cost of a single copy could increase from \$25 to \$35 and at that point there would be few buyers other than seniors, Skarvil said.

"We would have the highest priced yearbook per page of any area yearbook," she said.

There are 106 seniors in Clarenceville's class of 1992. If each bought a yearbook at \$35, that would raise \$3,710.

Yearbook business manager Adam Brandemuhl said it was unfair to charge more for a yearbook that is "diminishing in quality."

Without financial help, each of the 18 students in the class would have to raise about \$600 next year to help pay publishing costs, Skarvil said.
