

Hawks unbeaten in division duals

Farmington Hills Harrison posted an important victory in boys track duals today with a 75-38 defeat of its rival, the Lakes Division.

The Hawks won the duals on an at-4 overall and 3-0 in the Western Division of the Western Lakes Activities Association. The Chiefs are 1-2 and 2-2.

Harrison jumped in front early by winning every field event, including two by Brock Goy, in the shot put (43-12) and the discus (127-3).

The other winners were Steve Strum in the high jump (6-9), Jason Treger in long jump (20-8), and Dave Glosner in pole vault (9-6).

"We could not overcome the field events today," Canton coach Bob Richardson said. "We had nine points out of the field events and could not come back."

The Chiefs did not compete in the pole vault and always forfeit nine points there, but Richardson didn't expect Harrison to sweep the long jump. The Hawks also did a number on us in the prints, he added.

Duane Anderson won the 100-meter dash (10.8) with teammate Troy Granger second (11.0). The order was reversed in the 200 Granger won that race on 21.8 and Anderson

was second at 23.1. Granger and Anderson also helped the Hawks win the 400 relay, combining with Dreyer and Gil Chavez to turn in a 1:59 time.

Harrison's Jason Zydorski was a double winner with firsts in the 1,600 and 3,200 runs. He ran the former in 4:38.3 and the latter in 10:08.8.

Canton won both hurdle events, the middle-distance runs and three relays. Craig Miller had three firsts. Brock Kearney, Matt Devery and Dave Washburn were on two relays each.

Miller ran the quarter mile in 53.9 and anchored the 800 and 1,600 relays. Mike Gurehak, Paul Chudyk and Mike Kolbe preceded Miller on the 800 relay (1:35.2).

Kearney, Devery and Washburn joined Miller on the 1,600 unit (3:41.2) and the same threesome combined with Kevin Gudeth for an 8:28.2 time in the 3,200 relay.

FARMINGTON EVENED: Its record at 2-2 and improved to 2-1 in the WLAA Lakes Division with an 88-51 victory over visiting Livonia Stevenson.

The Falcons had only one winner in the field events but rebounded to win every relay, five running events and one hurdle race.

Chris Martin, Nigel Whit, Corby Lavery, Mario Nordini and Dave Chinar had individual victories and contributed to Farmington's overwhelming success in the relays.

Martin, Whit and Lavery were winners in the dash events with respective times of 11.4, 23.4 and 56.4 in the 100, 200 and 400 races. Nordini and Chinar won the distance runs with respective times of 2:11.8 and 11:10.2 in the 1,600 and 3,200 contests.

Farmington's winner in the field events was Jason Tucker in the high jump (6-4), and Dan Martinovsky won the high hurdles (15-7).

Kevin Koschowsky anchored the sprint relays. Whit, Martin and Eric Kirwan joined him in the 400 relay (1:46.6). The 800 relay (1:38.2) included Ryan Lewis, Lavery and Kirwan.

Nordini was on both distance relay teams, being joined by Lavery, Mike Rolles and Kirwan on the 1,600 squad (3:43.6). Chinar, Scott Carter and Kevin Afferback rounded out the 3,200 team that had a 9:02.4 time.

PLYMOUTH-SALEM remained unbeaten Thursday in the WLAA Lakes Division (3-0) with a 76-61 victory over visiting North Farmington. Don Johnson won two events and participated in Salem's 400 relay win. He won the long jump (19-2) and high hurdles (15-3).

Marcus Zevalkink, Johnson, Todd Forbes and Justin Fisher circled the track once in 16:7 to win the relay.

Salem had another double winner in Derek Cudde, who had times of 4:38.5 and 10:22 in the distance runs. The Hawks also got first places from Dan Stevenson in the discus (125-2), Brian Here in the intermediate hurdles (14-1), Mike Richards in the 200 dash (23-2) and Jason McDonald in the half-mile run (2:09.2).

The Raiders, 0-3 and 0-4, made a good showing with firsts in five individual events and three relays.

Tony Catchings won the 400 dash (52.8) and was the leadoff runner on the 1,600 and 3,200 relays.

Ryan Deuel, Dave Ashburn and Matt Link followed Catchings on the 1,600 team (3:46). Deuel, Yasu Kunioka and D.J. O'Hara also carried the baton in the 3,200 race (9:32.2).

North's Brad Pawlowski won the shot put (43-3), Chris Bouchet the high jump (5-6), Devon Richardson the pole vault (16-6) and Damon Hall the 100 dash (11.5).

Salem also won the distance events in which Karen Boudreau had a 5:48.5 time for the 1,600 run and Emily Farrell ran 12:31.3 in the 3,200 run. Courtney Sheldon, Lynda Schestgen, Sandra Van Hout and Sarah Lapinski gave the Hawks first place in the 1,600 relay (4:29.2).

North's Kevin Kestover won the 800 run in 2:31.7 and anchored the winning 3,200 relay. Lisa Wantuck, Alicia Crossland, Amy Roberts and

Kestover ran the relay in 10:50.2.

The Raiders, 0-3 in the Lakes Division and 0-4 overall, got second place in the 400 dash (1:04.7), high jump (5-6), Wantuck in the 800 and Crossland in the 3,200.
