Sides of her paintings have been shown at the Rackham Exhibitions at University of Michigan. The slides were selected for a national tour of school and community showings.


Mrs. Gullen spent the winter months in Florida and her paintings have appeared in the Gulf Coast Art Center in Belaire, the Norton Gallery at
