floor motionless with his right arm contorted like a snack to be eaten with a mug of beer. Carbone points to the fellow's twisted wrist, pointing out he could just as easily break the guy's arm. He won't, though.

Instead, Carbone applies a few good natured smacks to the back of the head and dispatches the mock assailant. Any more takes?

Probably not.

During the course of training, students will work with batons, knives and other weapons at these sessions — this one at Livonia Bentley High School. Carbone contends his form of training is more realistic in these days of high crime and violence.

"How many people do you see start a fight like this?" said Carbone, faking a karate stance seen in many a B-movie.

More likely, the confrontation is face-to-face. And, increasingly, probably, there will be a weapon of some type involved.

The ability to defend one's self brings people to his classes, which are taught in community education and parks and recreation programs throughout the area. At Livonia Bentley, students range from 5-8 years old to adults.

Carbone was the victim of a serious beating that left him in the hospital for five days when he was in his 20s. As a result, his martial arts training became more intensified.

Only recently, though, have the self-defense methods he employs been brought to light.

"I decided to let the cat out of the bag," said Carbone, who is the Michigan Director of the Police Self-Defense Institute International.

The secret, he said, was kept in Far Eastern families for 800 years with self-defense taught only to the firstborn in a master's class.

Carbone traveled to Okinawa, Japan, in March to train for the sixth time with Master Yon, the person considered the foremost authority on Isshinryu karate. Yon, in turn, visited and taught Carbone's class, es here May 1-5.

Self-defense may be the initial lure, but students readily speak of other benefits such as self-discipline, fitness and the ability to focus on tasks at hand.

The trunk show in the Southfield store was her first collaboration with Valentine's. "Someone saw one of my garments and asked for it," she explained.

De Wolfe's designs are sold all over the country, many with Fortune Women.

"I try to be ahead of the trends, but I like to do year-round garments that are not expensive, but well made," she said.

"I try to do classic things. I want

to catch the eye of that woman who needs one or two nice suits for dressier occasions."

Valentine's specializes in upscale larger women for sizes 14 and up.

According to Arlene Greer, store manager, the heartbeats of Valentine's is the personal service and wide range of prices and quality. She said it's vital for the larger woman to be able to stand tall and feel good about herself.
