

Southfield rejects county waste plan

As far as the city of Southfield is concerned, Oakland County will have to recycle its solid waste management plan before officials will consider implementing it.

The decision by the Southfield City Council Monday to reject the plan echoes concerns of the eight communities that make up the Resource Recovery and Recycling Authority of Southwest Oakland County (RRRASOC). The plan is not cost-effective or environmentally sound, said city administrator Robert Block.

Oakland County, and every county in the state, is mandated under

Public Act 641 to come up with a 20-year waste management plan. However, RRRASOC has concerns that the Oakland County program lacks a long-term response to the area's waste stream.

The county intends to contract services with the Long Valley landfill in the north-central section. Block said the dump only has five to six years capacity. The plan fails to target other sites which could be used in the county or considers using existing landfills in adjacent counties such as Washtenaw, where one of the largest dumps has a 20-year life, he said.

"Other options need to be explored," Block told the council.

"We need to address waste in southeastern Michigan, not just by county."

The state law doesn't discourage cross-county waste flow, Block said.

The \$250 to \$300 million incinerator planned for Auburn Hills also has generated further complications to the county waste management plan, according to RRRASOC.

Not only do nearby communities oppose having the waste-to-energy facility in their backyards, but the primary vendor withdrew from the project.

"The county wants to mandate a 40-year bond issue to build the incinerator," Block said. "That's a lit-

tle short-sighted considering how technology improves so rapidly. It would be outdated by the time it's built."

Excess capacity is available at Detroit's incinerator, he said. RRRASOC's report concludes the incinerator should be burned from the plan altogether and county officials should look at a regional solid waste system.

Roger J. Smith, deputy director of Oakland County's solid waste management division, was unavailable for comment.

Although Southfield council member Sidney Lantz was the only official to vote against the county's 641 plan initially because he objec-

ted to the incinerator, all council members went on record when it was first discussed saying they would not fund or support an incinerator, council member Denise Alexander said. Officials at that time only agreed to the concept. The council voted against implementing the plan 6-0 Monday night. Councilman Eli Robinson was absent.

Currently, RRRASOC provides several independent hauling con-

tracts to the eight communities. Block said Southfield, Farmington and Farmington Hills use Waste Management Services. The company owns several landfills in Oakland County and subcontracts with others in Wayne County. Other communities such as Walled Lake, South Lyon, Wixom and Livonia use Browning-Farris Inc. Township use Washtenaw landfill. BFI uses the Washtenaw landfill.

Upon receipt of a proper written claim and bond, a court action will be filed to decide the issue of forfeiture. MCL 213.7221. Failure to file a claim of interest and bond with the seizing agency within the 28 days shall cause the seized property to be declared forfeited and be disposed of according to law.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDINANCE SUMMARY

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE C-27-92, an Ordinance to amend the Code of Ordinances, City of Farmington Hills, Michigan, by amending Article V, Water Service, of Chapter 33, Water and Sewers, to provide for a secondary water meter for outdoor water use only.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDAINS

Section 1.
Chapter 33, Water and Sewers, Article V, Water Service, of the City Code is hereby amended to add a new section, Section 33-146.5, to read as follows:

33-146.5 Secondary (Dual) Water Meters.
At the option of a property owner, an additional water meter, referred to as a secondary water meter, may be installed. The secondary water meter shall allow for the metering of water that is directed exclusively to a sprinkler system or outside spigot or connection such as, but not limited to, a swimming pool, which water would not enter a sanitary sewer system and will not be applied to the calculation of the sewer disposal bill for the property. The installation, use and other provisions of this code which apply to a single water meter shall also apply to the secondary water meter.

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order by Mayor Hartsock at 7:15 p.m. on May 11, 1992, in Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan. Notice of the meeting was posted in compliance with Public Act 267-1975.

OFFICIAL PRESENT: City Manager Dealman, Director Lafford, Director Billings, Admin Assistant Schultz, City Clerk Busby.

Mayor Hartsock began the historical part of the meeting by presenting a proclamation to Councilwoman Richardson on the City's 125th Anniversary and commended her as Celebration Committee Chairperson.

Mrs. Richardson presented Emily McSweney with a certificate in appreciation for her driving the Council and staff in period costumes. She presented an official certificate in the Farmington Players.

Councilwoman Richardson introduced Co-Chairpersons Laura Meyers and Cathy Bricker who presented the Heritage Quilt to the City.

A few verses of the Farmington Museum were presented by Cara Clayton. Mayor Hartsock concluded the special historical Council meeting by reading into the record the May 6, 1967 minutes of the Village of Farmington. Council granted the requested sign variance for the K-Mart Corporation. Council approved the Greenery's request to conduct a wheelchair parade on May 12, 1992.

Council approved the City entering into the proposed Wastewater Discharge Ordinance Delegation Agreement with the City of Detroit.
