Rockets ousted in Class A semifinals, 2-1

Westland John Glenn's trip to Battle Creek for the Class A baseball finals was short-lived thanks to the work of a cereal killer.

Brandon Reed was the culprit Friday as he led Lapeer West to a 2-1 victory over the Rockets in the state semifinals held in Kelllogg's country, or Nichols Field to be exact. The execution was brief as the game lasted only one hour and 40 minutes.

The junior right-hander was murder on Glenn. His profile read sharp fastball mixed in with a deadly curveball.

Reed allowed only four hits, two walks and struck out nine in running his season record to 12-1.

"He's not overpowering like some of the other kids we've faced, but we was good," said Glenn coach Norm Huene, whose other trip to the state semifinals, also ended in a one-run loss (1-0 defeat in 1988 to Birmingham Brother Rice). "He was one of the best we've seen because of his craftiness. He kept it away from us and his control was right up there."

Reed, slimy-built at 6-feet, 3 inches and 150 pounds, outduelled Glenn junior Aaron Scheffer (6-5), the latter whom pitched a fine game in his own right, scattering six hits and two walks over seven innings. First hit of game.

Glenn's Bobby Hayes collected the game's first hit when he tripled with two outs, but senior second baseman had to exit early after rejoining his lower back. Pinch-runner Jamie Buford was ultimately left stranded.

Catcher Scott Bradshaw, who proved to be another killer for Glenn, doubled off Scheffer with one out in the top of the fourth to collect the Panthers' first hit. He later scored on Reed's single.

In the bottom of the inning, Glenn put two runners aboard with no outs when Scheffer singled and Ward walked, but Reed got out of trouble by retiring Derek Besco, Tayer Farley and Mike Bint in order.

"I was't going to hunt willy him (Besco) up," said Huene of his sophomore cleanup man. "I felt we had a good shot with him swinging away."

"We swung the bats tentatively and their pitcher threw the curve to keep us off balance. He also moved the ball well up and down."

Lapeer West added a run in the sixth when Brad Pethers reached base on an infield error, stole second and advanced to third on a Glenn throwing miscue, one of four errors on the day.

Bradshaw, a squat 5-7 catcher with a rifle arm and a .674 batting average, then drove Pethers home with a single, his second hit of the day.

"He (Bradshaw) is the best all-around player I've ever had," Lapeer West coach Tim Bradley said. "In 150 at-bats, he only has four strikeouts."

The Panthers threatened to blow the game open in the seventh, leading the buses with no outs on a pair

of singles and a walk, but Scheffer struck out pinch-hitter Run Johnson, ninth hitter Beau Buzzell and got Pethers on a groundout to end the threat.

With Glenn staring at its first shutout of the season, Besco opened the seventh by ripping a Reed fastball over the 330-foot mark in left field for a solo homer.

Reed followed by getting pinch-hitter Brian Besco to ground out to second, but sophomore Mike Bint lined a shot off the left field fence, just narrowly missing a homer.

But the hurly Glenn sophomore was held to a single as West left fielder Byron Townsend quickly grabbed the carom off the fence and got the ball back quickly into the infield.

"It was a fastball inside and I thought it was out," Bint said. "I thought it was gone for sure. We didn't see a lot of fastballs. It was tough to detect his (Reed's) fastball from his curve. We were told to sit on the fastball."
