tance of protecting them," Frantz said.
The shows will also deliver practical advice on the care and nurturing required upon finding an injured or orphaned animal.
Shows will take place at 10:30 a.m., 11:45 a.m. and 1 p.m. under the green-and-white striped tent in the Downtown Farmington Center parking lot on Grand River, one block east of Farmington Road. There is no charge.

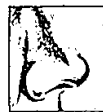
