SCHOLAR ATHLETES Harrison students Benjamin Pinsky and Julia Ritter were recently awarded the U.S. Army Reserve National Scholar Athlete Award.

The award is presented annually by the U.S. Army Reserve to high school students who have shown outstanding ability in both academics and athletics. Harrison principal Clayton Graham presented the two students with bronze Olympic-style scholar athlete medals at a June 4 school ceremony.
