A caring attitude will be attempted at Mulwood Square where patrons and visitors can enjoy a fun-filled weekend. Three tents will be set up hosting a myriad of activities which include face painting, pony rides 3-7 p.m. Friday and 1-5 p.m. Saturday as well as free popcorn, candy and other treats.

Also featured is a demonstration and hands-on introduction of interesting animals and plants presented on a child's level by naturalists with the intent of developing enthusiasm, curiosity and respect for the natural world around them.

The Upland Hills Mobile Farm will also be on-site 2-6 p.m. Friday and noon to 4 p.m. Saturday, with cows, goats, sheep and pigs. Those interested will even have the opportunity to milk a cow.

"There's something for everyone," said Paulson. "Attendees can even get married at Mulwood."

The Garden Wedding Chapel will be performing "mock weddings" for sweethearts ready to take at least a temporary chance at love.

The Orchard/12 Plaza in Farmington Hills will be celebrating with Midnight Madness on 11 p.m. Friday, July 10. A number of merchants within the plaza will be participating by offering customers the opportunity to register for free gifts.

Lucky participants can expect to win anything from a gift certificate for a free pair of shoes to a trip for two to Toronto.

According to Tom Sell, owner of Gabe's Shoes and organizer of the Midnight Madness event, stores will be giving out free gifts which are related to their business.

Sidewalk sales, in-store and a popcorn trailer equipped with everything from cotton candy and hot dogs to caramel and candy apples will be the order of the day.

"This is the first year the Orchard/12 Plaza has participated in the festival," said Sella. This effort is an attempt to build a merchant association of some kind and hope this year's efforts will grow to include other shopping centers and plazas.
