Mistakes and penalties.... Added together they explained the 26-7 setback Livonia's new Churchill High suffered in football at Ypsilanti Roosevelt Friday night.

Churchill played well. But, oh, for those penalties and mistakes! --

The Livonians had scored first.

On the fourth play of the game, Jerry Olliver slipped around end and sailed 57 yards to pay land. Jack Haghighi made the point and Churchill had a 7-0 lead.

But before the crowd was over, Roosevelt had rallied.

Churchill appeared to have Roosevelt contained. The Ypsilanti team stood fourth and 16.

Everybody knew a pass was coming, including the Churchill defense.

PASS ROOSEVELT did... and it worked to the Churchill two.

On the next play, Roosevelt scored.

Twice later Roosevelt scored after apparently being forced to give up the ball on fourth-down situations. But Churchill each time was guilty of a penalty.

Roosevelt kept the ball and went on to score.

"There were 100 yards in penalties sure hurt," said Coach Ken Kestner of Churchill.

Churchill twice put on long drives. Each time the rug was pulled out the same way--via a fumble lost on the Roosevelt 20.

STATISTICALLY, Churchill gained 217 yards rushing and 43 yards passing. Roosevelt moved 150 on the ground and 151 through the air.

Evan Smith led the Churchill attack as he gained 76 yards. Olliver was right behind with 75 yards in advances.

Defensively, Jack Stewart and Mickey Gooding stood out for Churchill which was playing only its third football game in its first season of competition.

Hence the penalties and mistakes could be better explained.
