Refuse Pick-up Planned

Farmington Township residents will have a chance to clean out basements, garages and backyards this month when refuse pickup trucks make extra stops throughout the township.

Stops have been scheduled starting Oct. 28 south of 10 Mile Rd. and Nov. 8 north of 10 Mile.

All junk except building materials, food waste and tree branches will be picked up, township officials said.

Newspapers should be bundled and furniture broken down. "Residents should take the discards to the road," said Township Supervisor Curtis H. Hall, "and leave it out until it gets picked up."

Hall explained that the clean-up campaign will not be completed on the respective starting days, but every area will be covered.

The cost of the extra pickup is covered in this year's sanitation contract, Hall said.

More than 950 tons of metal were collected in the May clean-up campaign, officials said.
