Car Wash Hours Limited

Operating hours for do-it-yourself car washes in the City of Farmington have been restricted under an ordinance passed during Monday's regular council meeting.

Hours have been restricted from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m., Monday through Saturday and 10 a.m. to 10 p.m., on Sunday. The council also ruled that exterior lighting should not cause a nuisance and may not be used between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m.

After several weeks of discussion before citizens and car wash operators, the council passed the ordinance and noted that it will be reviewed in 60 days. A clause calling for an attendant during operating hours was stricken from the original ordinance.

Car wash operators argued that attendants would be an excessive economic burden.
