Farmington AAUW Sets Three 'Fireside Chats'

"Fireside chats" with three state legislators from this area are planned tonight by the Farmington branch of the American Association of University Women.

State Senators George W. Kuhn, a Republican, and Roger E. Craig, a Democrat, as well as GOP representative Raymond L. Baker each will meet with a group of AAUW members in separate homes.

The three sessions will begin at 8 p.m., and the theme of each of the informal get-togethers will be legislation affecting education.

REP. BAKER will be at the home of Mrs. Allen Hurd, 35611 Quakerstown Lane. A lifetime resident of Oakland County and a pharmacist by profession, he was first elected to the House in 1950 and has devoted full time to legislative activities since that time.

He is a member of the House

Committees on Youth, Insurance, Liquor, and Chairman of the Committee on Conservation.

SEN. KUHN will meet his group at the home of Mrs. John Allen, 32293 Shawansee. He graduated from Central Michigan University, and did post-degree work at Harvard, University of Michigan, and Wayne State.

Prior to his election to the Senate, Senator Kuhn served 10 years in local government, the last eight years as mayor of Berkley. He won the "Outstanding Citizen of the Year" given by Ford Motor Co.

In the Senate he is serving as chairman of the Corporations Committee; vice chairman of the Committee on Municipalities and he is a member of committees on crime and riots in Michigan, Detroit newspaper strikes, conflict of interest, and narcotics and drugs.

SEN. CRAIG will meet with a group at the home of Mrs. Gwain Gillespie, 26175 Thirteen Mile, Franklin, a native of Pennsylvania. He graduated from Wayne State University. He is a past president of the Dearborn Board of Education, a member of the Michigan Association of School Boards, Michigan State Bar Association, and the Dearborn Bar Association. He was elected to the Senate in 1964.
