A new commission has sprouted in the city of Farmington. The Farmington Beautification Committee - a group of people who have spent years selling flowers, planting trees and encourgaing beautification efforts throughout the city - is no more. But that committee was a seed which grew into the Farmington Beautification Commission, a new, seven-member panel empowered by the city council to act as an official advisity group on beautification is-sue citywide. ent communities under the broad umbrilla of environmental issues," explained Mayor William Hartsock. "The committee has done an aut-standing effort, but we want to en-compass more than the idea of beautification.

Councilwoman JoAnne McShane said she was interested in seeing the new commission get involved in more environmental issues and ad-dress topics. The council will take applica-tions from interested reddents and screen them before making any ap-pointments.

Unlike its predecessor, the com-mission will require appointees be city residents. Those appointed will serve three-year terms, though the first commissioners will be appointed to staggered terms.
