That's Metroze Place the Bever-ly Hills, 50210 spinolf that won the ratings race in its second week on the air. The Fox series, airing on Wednesdays, features an ensemble cast of eight attractive actors play-ing a group of men and women in their 20s who live in a Los Angeles Courtyard apartment building. Metroze is but the first of a glut of such property set to hit the mar-ket this summer and fall. But if cre-ator Darren Star and Executive pro-

ator Darren Star and Executive producer Aaron Spelling (Beverly Hills, 90210) have their way, you'll already have a long-term agree-ment with their show, which debut-

ment with their show, which debui-ed July 8, that precludes success for the competition. It doesn't take an accountant to see how calculated the series' early success has been. First, brooding lead actor Grant Show was intro-duced to audiences as Jake Hanson, the older man who taught 80210's also-brooding ladies' man Luke Per-ry eventing he knew - a ort of trery everthing he knew-a sort of re-sume by inference. In May, Show sume by inference. In May, Show appeared on two episodes of 90210 and an equal number of national magazine covers. One national mag-azine even contacted Los Angeles-hand reporties with offers of cash azine even contacted Los Angeles-based reporters with offers of cash for interview tapes. Meanwhile por-traits of the cast—by top art photo-grapher Annie Liebowitz—went on display at The Gap stores everywhere

The plan was a success. Viewer-The plan was a success. Viewer-ship of the 90-minute premiere was exceeded only by that of the second episode, which drew more viewers than the competition on ABC, CBS and NBC, which were covering the third night of the Democratic Na-tional Convention. If Meiross Place continues to es-tablish itself in these still-early weeks it may doom the competi-

weeks, it may doom the competi-tion, which ranges from libidinous Freshman Dorm to soft-porn 200 Malibu Roud. On Fox alone, the fall-scason commettion located as fall-season competition includes a campus drama, Class of '96, and The Heights, a drama about a ga-rage band. "Our show is setting the standard for what these other shows are

about," says Star, who hased Mel-rose on his own early experiences about, says star, who based inter-rose on his some araly experiences living in Los Angeles. One of the show's most unusual el-ements is the presence of a gay character. Savari's Matt Fielding. Spelling thinks it's important for his young audience to see others accept-ing a gay friend on his own terms, and the actor agrees, adding, "I think we have an opportunity to present a very positive role model for a lot of gay teens." Locane is not so sanguine about her character, Southern vizen Sandy Louis Harling, who works as a cock-tall waitress while waiting for her big break in show business. "I really don't like anything about Sandy," the New Jersey-bred ac-tress insists.

Shue is more excited about his character, Billy Campbell, who is Thorne-Smith's roommate.

"I'm going through the same through arough the same through as far as making career choles. I guring out who I want to go out with, who my friends are gon-na be..things like that." Shue says. Ho's pragmatic about the chances of success for any of the look-alike shows. shows.

"I haven't seen any of the other shows, (but) I've read a couple of the scripts. I have a feeling they're all going to be a lot allke. I think it will come down to the specific writing, and the actors in each one. I can't inspirate they will all heat" Imagine that they will all last."

By the end of September, the casts of at least some of these shows should expect to be checking the Help Wanted section.
