AAA insurance plan looks like it'll be on ballot

It's beginning to look as if voters will see AAA Michigan's "Lower Rates Now" plan on the Nov. 3 bal-

lot.

Under a state Supreme Court order, the state Board of Canvessers
today was scheduled to certify there

are enough petition signatures.

The Legislature will have 40 calendar days to act on the auto insur-

er's 20 percent rate cut plan. But if the last six years are any indication, House Democrats will block the measure, forcing it onto the ballot. "But a lot of legal Issues were referred to the Court of Appeals," said AAA spokesman Tom Freel. "That is a atumbling block.
"Obviously we are very pleased that the public can vote on this issue. It would be tragic if 600,000 people were disenfranchised."

The second highest court must hear Democrats' claims that AAA's plan won't do what the insurer says it will — cut premiums.

Party-line vote

Democrata on the Board of Can-vassers, on a 2-1 party-line vote July 23, rejected the initiative peti-

tion. Said Democratic board member

Michael Payne: "I think people algned a petition thinking they were going to get a roillack. I don't think that's going to happen; I think just the contrary is going to happen." One Republican member, James Alexander of Birmingham, abstained because his law firm does work for AAA.

AAA asked the Supreme Court to order the Board of Canvassers to place it on the ballot without debat-

ing the proposal's merits. The high court's brief order, issued Thurs-day, said: "There being no dispute that suf-

ficient valid signatures were filed, we direct the Board of State Can-vassers to certify the sufficiency of the petition by 12 noon on Monday,

Aug. 3.

"Following the certification, the Secretary of State shall forthwith submit the petition to the Legisla-

aubmit the petition to the segmenture.


"We remand this case to the Court of Appeals, which shall set an expedited schedule for consideration of the plaintiffs (AAA) claim that the Board of State Canvasaers lacks the authority to consider is-

sues other than whether there are sufficient valid signatures to quali-ty the proposal for certification, and the intervening defendantal claims that the proposal is invalid because of defects other than the signature requirements."

Intervening defendants include trial lawyers, whose ability to file auits would be diminished by the AAA proposal; the Michigan Citi-zens Lobby and consumer groups.

The Board of Canvasers' decision put state officials in a tough apot. An assistant attorney general, Gary Gordon, said he believed board members had no authority to address the merits of the proposal.






