One of the best kept lunch spot secrets la the Summer Tea Room at Oakland University's Meadow Brook Hall in Rochester Hills. Open 11:30 a.m. to 3 p.m., Monday through Friday, the tea room is like the luacious fruits and vegetables of summer. You can't wait until they arrive, and are sorty to see them go.

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Hurry, time is running out. The tea room will close September 4. It's a great place to meet a friend and "catch-up."

The tea room's menu has changed quite a hit since Cregar Enterprises Ex-ecutive Gourmet, Inc., won the Meadow Brook account for catering. Chef Steven Machlay cooks up an ever changing menu of creative soups, sandwiches, salads and entrees sure to please every polate.

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"This is an elegant house. It deserves food that reflects the surroundings," said Machlay, a graduate of Andover High School, Bloomfield Hills who planned to be an actor and studied at Wayne State University. He worked in restaurants to pay his expenses, and decided to switch careers.

"I like the husiness, I get to be creative and expressive. I enjoy working with my hands," he said.

Machlay's father and stepfather are both in the restaurant business. His father, Jim owned a small family restaurant in California, and is now in the pizza business. His stepfather, Richard, owns Cregor Enterprises, and his

pizza business, rits surpassed, and his bruther Michael is a vice president in the company. But, like a lot of people who become chefs, Machlay started out ns dishwasher.

with plans to be an actor, he moved to California and worked with his father Jim Mochlay in his family-style restau-rant. While in California he completed rant. He stayed in New York for a year and worked at a number of restaurants before moving back to the Detroit area. Machlay worked at the Money Tree restaurant in Detroit and was a sous-chef at the Whitney in Detroit before he joined Cregar Enterprises.

"Originally they served hamburgers, sandwickes and salads in the tea room," said Machlay who is working to upscale the menu a little. "A lot of families and kids come here, so I didn't want the prices to be too high," he said. The menu is constantly changing. Usually there (are) has cold entree sailads, a burger, a couple of sandwiches, a pasta, fish and meat dish.

"My main emphasis is fresh," said Machlay who enjoys being a chef and takes pride in his work. "I like to educate people about food!" For example, he put some enokidake mushrooms in the vegetarian sandwich. "It wasn't on the menu, people sak what is that?" they learn something new about food."

Machlay's enthusiasm and sense of alventure with food shows in his menu. Cranherries were added to a chilled Burscht (best soup) to add a fruity, summery flavor. The angel hair posta with broccoli, cauliflower, red pepper, Bermuda onlon, sun-dried tomatoes and nosemary cream has pistachio nuts in it. and resemery cream has pistachie nuts in it.

# Zonjic and Friends thrill capacity crowd



The Kalcidoscope series is among several chamber events in our area that offer selections mostly off the beaten track. It has extended its latest season into the sumer to include two additional programs. Both Bowers, who is an accomplished flutist, is the director of this series. flutist, is the director of this series. As can be espected, much of the material is centered around the flute. The latest event at the Birmingham Community House, was oliverain from the traditional classical format. It featured Alexander Zonjie and Friends with a program of juzz selections.

Zonjie is a celebrated flutist from this area who straddles both sides of the musical fence. He is thoroughly trained in both chassical and juzz repertoire, appealing to listeners of a variety of tastes

and backgrounds.

This latest occasion drew a capacity crowd. While most were not among the regular classical listeners, there were quite a few familiar faces from the other side of the fence.

While this summer has been generously cod, the crowded event with no air conditioning caused a certain degree of discomfort especially to the energetic performers who were in constant motion, a fact that was mentioned in some of Zonić vermarks. This, however, was only a minur obstacle to the general high spirit.

In an event of this nature, the human artistic energy is augmented by the state-of-the-art technology of sound equipment and amplifiers. The control panel, with its many lights and levers, could have been used as a setting for a Star Trek episode.

This, however, did not diminish the fervent activity of the performers, consisting of keyboard players Michael

Balos and Ian Smith, percussionist Lorenzo Brown, and drummer Danny Cox to gether with Zonjic.

They performed selections from Zonjic's many LP's — "Elegant Evening," "When is it Real," and "Neon."

There were impressive combinations of skill and showmanship in this performance.

Watching Danny Cox tossing around and switching between percussions of different variety and sixe was like watching a circus aerobat with music talent to boot.

Percussionist Lorenzo Brown pushed his percussion battery to the limit by providing complex rhythmic sound combinations which came across as music, rather than a mere pounding noise.

The flute is considered to be among the gentlest wind instruments, Zonjic, however, needed strong lungs in work.
