"It's safer from the standpoint that something below the surface doesn't have to be exposed to the oir," said UIII Brannigan, on environmental engineer with Millgard. The processing of the processing o

"That's the beauty of it — the shear, raw power and mechanical mixing ability," Branningan said.

"What our tool does is allow a path for any process that can remediate in place, pull up to the ground or micro encapsulation (mixing with concrete)."

"Engineering firms is the second level. A company needing a site cleanup will normally hire an environmental engineering firm. We want to get them to understand what we can do.

"The third level is the level of the customer itself," he said.
