Freshman Andy Fitzpatrick hasn't been on the Holy Cross cam-pus a month and already has made

Fitzpatrick distinguished himself from six other candidates during two-n-day drills. He was one of

three freshmen vying for the start-ing job after Holy Cross lost its top three quarterbacks to graduation. Fitzpatrick replaces three-year starter Tom Ciaccio.

"Going into last spring, the quar-terlunck situation was perceived as a weakness," said Vans, who played quarterhack for Holy Cross from 1971-73. "Now I can envision it being a position of strength and depth on our team.

"I think the one thing that separated Andy from the others revolves oround the offensive line, which hasn't played together very long. Andy has shown the ability to take a negative play and turn it into a positive one."

The 6-foot-4, 210-pound Fitzpa-trick becomes the first Holy Cross

freshman to start at quarterback since Jeff Wiley took over midway in the 1985 season. Wiley started 38 consecutive games and set 23 pass-ing and total offense records at Holy Cross.

Fitzpatrick gulded Harrison to the Class BB championship last year, throwing for 1,637 yards and 22 touchdowns. He completed 89 of 173 passes, and he also rushed for 164 yards and three TDs. Fitzpa-trick was the All-Observer quarter-back as needs. back as a senior.

Lopez picked off the pass after lineman Anton Babicz deflected the ball in the air. CC coach Tom Mach said. "The defense really set the tone by denying a tot of apportunities and giving us good field position." CC gained 371 total yards, including 304 on the ground against St. John's, a big-school playoff team in Ohio in '91 and a favorite to win the Tolesto city championship.

The Shamrocks took a 12-0 lead with 1:00 left in the first quarter on a 1-yard dive by Krueger, set up by Lopez's 43-yard reception.

CC marched 52 yards on its last possession of the half and the drive ended with 22 yard field goal by junior Adam Borcherdt for a 15-0 lend.

Barbara completed three straight passes on the drive, including one to Ken Ryus for 13 yards and a pair to Brady Pankow for 11 yards.

"The drive at the end of the first half was real class, terrific for the first game," Mach said. "It was a big momentum change because it made is 15 instead of 12."
