Warriors trounce Falcons, 36-6

He may not wind up on the cover of GQ, but the sideline attire worn by Walley Lake Western coach Chuck Appap is proving quite effective.

Sporting a T-shirt emblazoned, "Offense wins games, defense wins championships," Appap watched his Warriors move to 2-0 on the young season Saturday with a 36-6 trouncing of host Farmington.

"It's been a long time since we started the season 2-0, but we have to continue to get better," Appap said. "I've been wearing this shirt

for two weeks and it isn't coming off."

The Warriors benefited from some sloppy play by the Falcons, who turned the ball over five times, all on interceptions.

Senior quarterback Dave Watkins helped his teammates get on the board in the first quarter when he connected with senior wide receiver Rob Budd on a 29-yard scoring pass.

A two-yard run by Gary Benedict in the second quarter, and a pair of Travis Ilaqueon field goals (he had three on the day), increased the

margin to 19-0 at the half.

The Warriors came out and played ball control in the third quarter, eating up the first four minutes with an eight-play, 69-yard scoring drive.

Senior Arnie Gillett, who paced the Warriors' 212-yard ground attack with 166 yards of his own, rounded out the scoring in the fourth quarter when he burst through the Falcons' defensive line for a 50-yard touchdown run.

"We mixed it up pretty well," Appap said of his offensive unit that totaled 333 yards. "We didn't play very well in the first half, but we got

better in the second."

The Falcons, who have struggled on both sides of the football in their two losses, tallied their only points of the season in the fourth quarter when quarterback Mike Tokar plowed his way into the end zone from two yards out.

Tokar, feeling pressure all afternoon from Zack Budd and the rest of the Warrior defenders, completed only 10-26 passes for 114 yards. The Falcons were held to 27 yards on the ground.

Watkins, on the other hand, finished 5-10 passing for 121 yards. Budd had three receptions for 67 yards.

In the second quarter, the Hawks turned Brendan Cotter's pass interception into another TD. Harrison got the ball at the Salem 42, and sophomore fullback Nick Williams scored from 1 yard six plays later.

On first down, the Hawks lost another fumble and gave Harrison possession at their 12.

Despite a 15-yard penalty against the Hawks, they needed two plays to score again as sophomore tailback Kevin Bryant broke two tac-

kles around left end for a 24-yard TD run. Smith passed to Dave Gloszner for two points and a 22-0 margin with 3:20 left in the half.

"It was a very sloppy game for both teams — us with penalties (10 for 110 yards) and them with turnovers — but we escaped with another one," Harrington said.

Harrington had 187 rushing yards and 269 total. Bryant carried 10 times for 71 yards, and Smith add-

ed 48 on seven tries.

"Salem did stop our inside running game, but Kevin got some yards outside," Harrington said. "We didn't sustain too much. The Rocks played good defense against us, but the kids did what they had to do."

Salem crossed midfield once late in the game, reaching the Harrison 45. The Rocks got 97 of their 122 yards on the ground. Andy Szydlowski gained 41 yards on 11

carries, and Rob Kenney was 2-of-5 passing.

"There were more mistakes than just the turnovers," Moshimer said. "It looks like we were never taught to block or tackle."

"I told the kids we're not as bad as a football team as we showed out there. We have to suck it up and come back, because we don't want to spend too many more Friday nights like that."
