A graduate of North Farmington High School, Paulson used to be in the electronics and appliance business. "My mom made great sandwiches," he said, "and I learned in retail to make the customer the focus. This was a natural crossover."

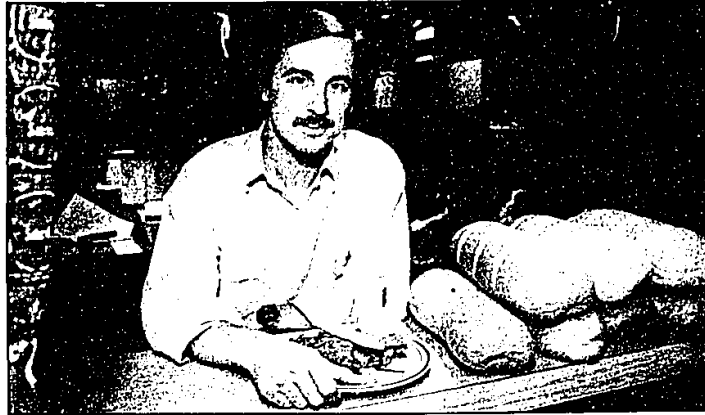
Whether you eat in or out, Lox, Stock & Barrel aims to please. There's a deli counter with luncheon meats, and homemade rye bread which sells for \$2.70 a loaf, chips, pop, juice, mustard and other deli items.

The dining room has a cheerful, bright interior with windows that face the plaza and seats 100 people. There are tables and booths.

Lox, Stock & Barrel uses Kelly corned beef and roasts turkey for sandwiches daily. Soups are homemade and include chicken broth served with noodles, rice or Matzo ball, hot spicy chili, diet cabbage Borscht and a soup of the day like Krepelach soup, a delicious dumpling style meatball made from beef, eggs, onions and spices served in chicken broth.

For lighter appetites, there's a Julienne, Greek, and vegetable salad. The grilled chicken salad is also popular.

Corned beef and roast turkey are house specialties, but you'll also find

Other traditional favorites include hot roast beef and turkey sandwich, potato latkes served with sour cream and

apple sauce, cheese blintzes with sour cream, apple sauce or blueberries, stuffed cabbage, liver and onions, roasted chicken and corned beef and cabbage. Specials change daily. On Sept. 29 pork roast, stuffed peppers, baby back ribs and broiled white fish were on the menu.

Lox, Stock & Barrel also serves burgers, broiled chicken breast, hot dogs and Wilno Kosher Knockwurst.
