The Warriors defeated host Farminton Hills Harrison for the first time in
22 years of competition behind the power running of senior Amie Gillert, 21-7.

It merked the first time Harrison, a
3-0 hoser to Livonia Franklin the previous week, has suffered back-to-back
defeats since 1978 when it lost to North
Formington and Plymouth Salem.
Western's stock will certainly rise following the victory, which boosted its
record to 2-0 in the Western Division of
the Western Lakes Activities Association and 4-0 overall.
