Man helps nab robbery suspects

A 51-year-old Warren man is credited with providing information that helped in the appre-hension of two Detriot men charged in the rob-bery of a Farmington lills gas station carly

bery of a Paramington time gas actuon carly Wedneady moming. "He is credited with detecting that something was wrong," said Detective Sgt. Charles Nebus. "He heard a (car) horn and noticed the cashier was gone. He also later checked on the female victim."

The Warren man, as well as several Southfield officers - who apprehended the two suspects in Detroit — are being recommended for citations from the Farmington Hills police department. Donald L. Cochran, 33, and Michael E. Rubin-

Donald L. Cochran, 33, and Michael E. Rubin-pon, 29, face felony charges in connection with the robbery at Old Orchard Shell, 31529 Northwestern Highway, Approximately 3180 and the cashier's purse was reported stolen. The items have been recovered. Cochran is charged with assault with intent to plo while armed, which carries a maximum pen-alty of life in prison, as well as one charge of

possession of crack cocaine, less than 25 grams, a four-year felony. He also was charged with fice-ing and cluding, a one-year misdemeanor. Robinson is charged with ansult with intent to rob while armed. Pleadings were not available. Bond was set for both at 350,000 carb-sourcety. A preliminary examination on the charges is scheduled for Sept. 30. At about 5:46 a.m., a car occupied by two mon pulled into the gas station. The passenger waiked into the gas station while the driver of three ratiopped at one of the gas pumps. The driver walked toward the service window and then turned around without a word and walked back to the era. back to the car.

back to the car. The passenger entered the building and asked the cashier for two packs of eigarettes. While she rang up the purchase, the man asked for direc-tions to Maple Road. He bad his hand in his jacket pocket, which he thrust toward the cashier implying a weapon. The man threatened to harm her if she didn't open the cash register.

The man ordered the cashier to take the cash tray into the bathroom. As they water the bathroom, the man began removing money

from the tray. In the bathroom, he grabbed the remaining rolled coins and ordered the cashier to lay on the floor. The 51-year-old Warren man, who was outside the station, heard the driver of the getaway car bonking the horm as the other man left the sta-tion. The Warren man also got the getaway car license plate number and called police. Southfield polico received the information over the radio. Offfocers watted near Northwest-ern and Evergreen for the getaway car, which they followed. "They gave chase onto the Lodge Preeway." Netus said. A series of miorn accident involv-ing police and non-police vehicles occurred dur-ing the chase, he added. The men were chased to the Six Mile and

The men were chased to the Six Mile and Southfield area where they got out of their car and fied on foot, with Southfield officers in pur-suit, Nebus said.

The driver of the car was apprehended shortly after when he was found trying to break into a house. The passenger who had continued run-ning also was apprehended, Nebus said.
