Hazards from page 13A year when 5,000 gallons were col-lected. lected. At the May disposal day, only 350 gallons of latex paint were dropped off. But that was after the cities sent out flyers inform-ing residents they can dispose of the non-toxic paint on their own. "We had no flyers this time about the paint," Biasell said.

"We may want to put something out before-hand next time." At the next disposal day planned for sometime in May, 1993, residents also may receive a flyer with information when they bring in latex paint. "We hate to turn someone away who takes the time to bring it. We'll just tell them the right way to do it."







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
