Operational costs could be reduced in staffing with the public library's pay schedule. A joint venture also could reduce an overlap in the duplication of collections, and the library would benefit from improved utility rates available through OCC, Papai said.

Because building of a new facility either on the college campus or elsewhere in Farmington Hills

would take voter support, library would take voter support, library officials asid a joint venture would avoid duplication of tax-supported services. A bond issue would not include high land acquisition costs if OCC leases the land to the library, Papai said.

Some council members, particularly Farmington Hills Mayor Jonathan Grant, doubted that Jaksen's location preference is one preferred by students. He said he suggested a survey of students to determine how they feel.

"It is his position and his own opinion where the library should be located. It is not a mandate from the (OCC) board," Grant said.

Council metabers urged continued negotiations. "It would be a shame to have this move so far

and not happen because of the lo-cation," sald Farmington Mayor Wiliam Hartsock.

Farmington Hills councilwom-Farmington Hills councilwoman Nancy Bates suggested public hearings to hear voters opinions about a possible merger. "I still believe it's the councils' responsibility to test the community on this. I think we need to get people on board. You can't have too much information to make this decision on."

Farmington councilman Arnold Campbell suggested getting the Farmington Public Schools involved. "If they got behind us and supported it, I think it would be helpful." He also suggested forming a committee to study the issue and present the OCC trustees with a final recommendation.
