

Rocks runners-up in soccer tourney

Plymouth Salem soccer teams have been good enough to reach the final of the Class A boys tournament two of the last four years. But the Rocks haven't been very lucky in championship games, losing each time by a one-goal difference.
Warren DeLaSalle won its second state title in three years Saturday, defeating Salem 2-1 in overtime at Bloomfield Hills Andover High.
"You have to be good and lucky to win it all," Salem coach Ken Johnson said. "DeLaSalle (unranked in the last coaches' poll) has been coming on with a lot of momentum since the regular season."
"I thought we were good enough to win," Salem senior Tom Baker said. "Any team can beat another team at any time. I guess we weren't that team. We were kind of unlucky."

Though the Rocks (18-3-2) outlasted and outplayed DeLaSalle, the game was decided when Tim Fulton scored his 17th goal 4 1/2 minutes into the first sudden-death overtime.
Fulton dribbled toward the middle and got open on the right side, firing a shot that Salem goalkeeper Paul Dood stopped but couldn't hold. Fulton kicked in the rebound for the winning goal.
"The kid went right through me," Dood said. "I don't think it should have been a goal, but they got the best of us. It was bouncing around, and I couldn't get to where it was."
"Give him credit. (Fulton) got his foot on it before Dood could get a hand on it again," Johnson said.
Salem controlled play most of the first half and outshot the Pilots 13-5. The Rocks had six shots on goal to DeLaSalle's two.
However, the Pilots (18-4-1) led 1-0 at halftime after Nick Krawczyk converted a free kick with 47 seconds left in the half. The shot followed a handball violation by Salem defender Brian Spuck, though he appeared to hit the ball with his shoulder.
Dood started to his left but slipped trying to recover when Krawczyk's shot deflected off the Salem wall into the right corner.
"I felt we played our game; we had good passing," Johnson said. "We just couldn't get that one good connection."
"We got screwed up in the dressing room at halftime and took it right to them. When we got that goal early, I thought we were on our way, but it was not meant to be."
Salem senior Joe Perron tied the score at 30:34 in the second half. He shot the ball from the left corner, past the DeLaSalle keeper. The ball got caught between defender Matt Mollicone's feet in front of the goal and spun into the net.
A deciding factor was DeLaSalle's ability to keep Baker from scoring according to DLS coach Tim Mukhtar, who credited Jason Jaroch for marking the all-state midfielder.
"I thought the key to the game was Jason Jaroch," Mukhtar said. "There's no doubt Tommy Baker is the best player in the state. Jaroch is our best marker. I told him to stay on Baker and go wherever he goes."
"Baker is going to be a big-time college player and for us to get out of the game without him scoring was a real key. I told the kids, 'If we control Baker offensively, we will win the game.'"
While acknowledging the Rocks outplayed DeLaSalle in the first half, Mukhtar thought he detected a Salem defensive flaw late in an even second half.
"As the game progressed, I thought their defense was weakening," he said, "because our forwards were having a little more liberty with it. We were starting to create more space, and their midfielders were having trouble getting back."

DCD wins 6th straight
