southeastern Farmington Hills, in areas that McDonald had not represented as a county commissioner, he said, "You need to make new friends," Feuer said. The court, located on 10 Mile, serves Farmington and Farmington Hills.

McDonald and campaign manger, Terry Sever, a former Farmington Hills mayor and current councilman, cited several factors: a heavier than expected turnout and more money spent by Parker. "McDonald estimates that he spent about \$80,000 total in his entire campaign. Neither Parker nor Fauer, would reveal the "Webbs. 2011 paying the hills"

"We're still paying the bills,"

Feuer said.

"We did a lot of things right,"
Sever said. "We had an unexpected turnout of 10,000 people who

Sever maintained "voter fal-loff" occurs when people reach the judicial candidates, with many voters choosing simply to ignore or skip voting in this category.

Gerald Feye, professor of politi-cal science at Oakland Communi-ty College Orehard Ridge campus in Farmington Hills, said that being a woman was no guarantee of being elected this year, al-though the Anita Hill trial made many women more interested in seeking out candidates strong on women's issues.

Whether area women voters specifically voted for Parker is difficult to determine, Faye said. "I don't think that anyone can know that kind of thing," Faye said.

Parker said those who east bal-least for her were informed voters. "I made an effort to give people as much information as I could," Parker said.

Both candidates stressed their door-to-door, person-to-person ef-

Parker also commended Feuer, her Southfield-based political consultant. A Cornell University graduate, Feuer has handled the campaign for local judges, like

Brian MacKenzie in Walled Lake and Susan Moiseev in Southfield as well as a variety of candidates in New York.

Of Feuer, Parker said: "He's very bright, very prepared and very honest."

Feuer said that he is particular about who he works for, "I do not work for any candidate who asks me," he said. "The fir.t winning ingredient is always the candidate. I do not approach candidates. I operate only on references."

Parker's willingness to discuss even legal issues, like how to pay a ticket, worked on her behalf when she spoke with residents, Feuer said.

Parker said that she was "absolutely surprised by the controversy" McDonald initiated by his legal challenge concerning Parker's wearing her magistrate's robes in her campaign ads.

"There's no question that it is appropriate for me to wear the robes," Parker said. "I wear the robes in my job."

McDonald also complimented his campaign manager Sever. "He's very organized and a good, hard worker," McDonald said. "We're in agreement philosophi-cally. I'm very impressed with Terry."
