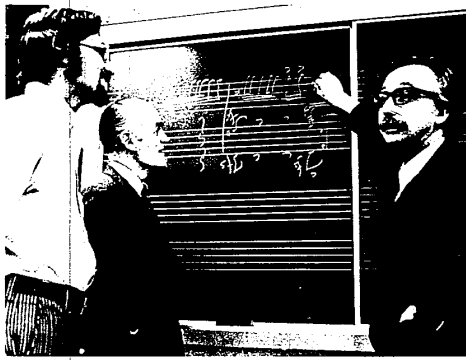
Also included will be an explanation of government laws and attitudes on the alteration and mutilation of coins and currency and what to do if money is damaged or destroyed by fire, or flood.

### James Tocco To Return For Schoolcraft Festival

Pianist James Tocco will return to Schoolcraft College this summer for his second guest appearance in the Schoolcraft Summer Music Festival. He will be heard Tuesday, July 13.

Tocco was a popular performer last summer. He was just returning from Moscow where he took fifth place in the Tchaikovsky competition. Other featured soloists during July will be the Kenneth Jewell Choral and cellist Mario DiFlore.

Now in its fifth year, the festival is presented in conjunction with Schoolcraft's Summer Music School. The Court Festival Orchestra is made up of the faculty of the school, headed by Wayne Dunlap, augmented by musicians from the Detroit Symphony and from the school.

Most of the faculty members are new members of the Detroit Symphony and it was decided to hold this year's concerts Tuesday evenings instead of Wednesday, because it fitted better into their schedules for the Meadow Brook concerts at Rochester.

THREE COURT Orchestra concerts are scheduled, along with three chamber music concerts and three student orchestra concerts. All concerts will be on the Schoolcraft campus, 18600 Haggerty Rd., Livonia, and tickets for all will be on sale at the door.

The festival will run as follows:  
 July 9-A faculty chamber music concert.  
 July 13-The Court Orchestra with Tocco.  
 July 16-A concert by the student orchestra.  
 July 20-The Kenneth Jewell Choral will present a survey of the development of American Choral Music.  
 July 22-A student chamber music concert.  
 July 23-A faculty chamber music concert.  
 July 26-A concerto award concert. Outstanding students at the school will be honored.  
 July 27-The Court Orchestra with DiFlore.  
 July 30-The final student orchestra concert.

Plans for the chamber music concerts have not been finalized, but it is expected that they will feature guest soloists, and they too will concentrate on American composers and music.

SOME 100 STUDENTS have been accepted for the school, which runs July 6 through 30. Most are from Oberlin, although several will come from as far away as Pontiac and Windsor.

This year's program will concentrate as usual on ensemble playing, and has been expanded to include a course for percussionists. Norman Fickett of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra will teach this group.

The school is also unusual in having classes for pianists who wish to play in chamber music groups or with orchestras. This class is taught by Donald Morelock.
