Little Joe, still fonding the trophy, reported that neither he nor his buddy, Warren, was allowed to use the chairs they took with them.

"I didn't have the foot rests on mine," he said, "and it was out. And Warren didn't have the right kind of supports down in front. But we did all right with the used chairs."

They did. Little Joe finished third in the 40-yard dash, and Warren was runner-up in the four-man
