

Botsford alumnus joins hospital staff

Dr. Craig Gordon, a medical oncologist and cancer researcher, has joined the professional staff of Botsford General Hospital in Farmington Hills.

Gordon, a Botsford Hospital alumnus, has been selected to orchestrate the formation of a comprehensive cancer center at Botsford Hospital.

Gordon currently lives in Southfield. He will be seeing patients at Botsford.

Plans for the new center include the administration of both chemotherapy and radiation therapy in the treatment of malignant diseases. Gordon also expects to conduct experimental trials and research at the center.

Prior to joining Botsford, Gordon was on staff at Harper Hospital, Grace Hospital and Hutzel Hospital, Detroit. After graduation from Botsford Hospital in 1987, he was named a




