Well. There are two big network holi-day specials for the week beginning Sunday, Dec. 20. CBS' Holiday Greetings From Ed Sullivan, alring in prime time Sunday, is a col-lection of holiday-themed perfor-mances from the 20-year span of the mances from the 20-year span of the late showman's variety series. Bob Newhart serves as host of the two-hour special. ABC offers the best bet for Christmas morning (Friday, Dec. 25) with its Wait Disney World Very Merry Christmas Parade. Hosts Joan Lunden and Regis Philbin welcome Golden Pal-ace stars Betty White and Cheech Marin. Several network series features new episodes related to the holidays this week. On Sunday, Fox presents "The Dysfunctional Family Christ-mas" on In Living Color, followed

by a holiday bapilism on Roc and an episode of Married...With Chil-dren that finds Al working as a shopping mail Santa. Tuesday, Dec. 22, on CBS, a paramedic dressed as Santa Claus delivers a baby on *Res*cue: 911. Children will enjoy the CBS re-

broadcasts of two animated specials Thursday, Dec. 24. Then holiday dessert is the subject of the lighthearted special Fruitcake. Both traditional and contempo-rary holiday music brighten the week. Tuesday on A&E Stage, the 250th anniversary of Handel's Mes-siah is honored with a gala per-formance in Dublin, Ireland, featur-ing world-class soloists. The Learn-ing Channel goes to Oxford, England, on Friday morning for Carols From Christ Church.
