Eight Mile's bad points, she said, are cluttered signs, poor streetlighting, unsightly dump-sters, "adult" businesses, the lack of any one government builds in charge, and a perception that it's a high crimo area. of Livonia and Dan Lewis of trolt, as well as Southfield Do town Development Authority rector Wendy Strip-Sittsamer.

"The image of Eight Mile is re-ally important," Strip-Sittsamer said. "For too long, it's been a boundary."

The task force was called to-gether by Southfield.

Eight Mile forms the northern border of Wayne County and the southern border of Macomb and Oakland. For about 19 miles — from Eastland to Inkter Road — it is divided. In the 1920s, an inter-county highway commission visualized it as a major traffic ar-tery.
