Graphics is a major interest of Landay and her husband, Mar-tin, chairman and CEO of Globe Trading Co., Detroit. Their pri-vate collection includes prints and three-dimensional pleces by 20th century American artists

such as Warhol, Johns and Lichtenstein — but extends to Picasso, Chagall and Clemente.

Landay is currently on the beard of the Archives of Ameri-can Art/Smithsonian Institu-tion. Leat November she created a national reputation with her creative and successful Mailbox Auction fund-raiser.


