The Storens, who helped lead Marian to a Class A basketball championship, looked just as comfertable playing volleyhall together.



CC senior forward Brian Paluk scored a game-high 26 points on 11-21 shooting but managed only five rebounds. He had been avereging near 15 per game for the Shamrocks who are 2-4.

"Their big guys played tough and made us after shots," Holowicki said. "I'd say they changed 10 to 12 of our shots. Robinson came out of nowhere and shot with no fear. We competed but besides competing, we've got to beat people."

The win leaves Borgess at 4-1 oversil. Each team made 26 field goals but Borgess made 18 of 24 free throws compared to CC's 61. Whitfield and Charles Smith joined Robinson in double figures with 17 and 16 points, respectively.
