where the Raiders sank 22 of 33 shots.

Pennala nailed three triples in the third quarter when North made its move and got control of the lead.

"With Scot Lord injured, we had to have someone step up," Dolak said. "Quiz (Matt Quisling) did a good job inside, and Chris Ward had about seven rebounds in the last quarter."

"John had a slow start, but he had a real strong second half. He's probably the best three-point shooter in the conference."

North took an early lead with the help of free throws (13-of-18 in the first half) and was in front 13-9 after one period and 22-15 in the second.

The Chiefs rallied to tie with a Brad Paskievitch triple and made eight straight free throws — Paupe was 8-of-8 in the quarter — to end the half and take a 30-28 lead.

Pennala's second triple put the Raiders ahead 38-35, and North

scored the last nine points of the third quarter to build a 47-37 advantage. North was 7-of-11 from the floor in that period.

Whittle's dunk and three-point play to start the fourth started the Canton rally. Whittle and Paupe converted consecutive North turnovers to get the Chiefs within 54-52, but Canton failed to get the tying basket with a third straight turnover.

Dolak and Pennala answered with two free throws each to give North a four-point cushion with 1½ minutes left.

"I thought the kids did a great job," Negoshian said. "It was a gutsy performance down the stretch. The kids played hard and we got a few breaks."

"In the first half rebounding hurt us, and we did miss a lot of open shots, which we normally don't do," Payne said. "A positive thing was we didn't give up at the end. We were down 10 and made a run at them."

OCC loses top scorer

Oakland Community College's men's basketball team won one last week, but the Raiders may have lost a big one.

Myron Banks, the team's leading scorer and rebounder, became an academic casualty. Unless a way is found for him to complete his class, he will be through for the season.

Banks was averaging 19.3 points and 10.9 rebounds a game. He did play Wednesday against visiting St. Clair CC, helping the Raiders even their Eastern Conference record at 2-2 with a 91-82 victory. OCC is 6-8 overall.

"It was a good win," said OCC coach Lynn Reed. "We were happy to get it. Now we have to deal with losing Myron."

St. Clair led 43-34 at the intermission and was up by 13 early in the second half, but Reed switched his pressure defense to a less aggressive type and that made a difference. "They had a

hard time handling that press," he said.

The Skippers also had a hard time handling Craig Martin. OCC's freshman guard found his range in the second half, canning five straight three-pointers. He finished with 21 points, 17 coming in the second half.

Troy Coleman collected 26 points, eight assists, five rebounds and five steals to pace the Raiders. Banks hit 12-of-19 shots to total 24 points. He also had 11 boards and three steals.

Kevin Woodmore (from Avondale HS) added six points and six assists. Ray Moreland (Southfield-Lathrup) had eight points and four offensive rebounds, and Bill Knight grabbed 12 rebounds.

Brian Coleman's 26 points topped St. Clair. Kurt Clark contributed 13.

OCC outrebounded the Skippers 42-24, with 23 offensive boards.

SC left with 7 cagers

Well, it might have been worse.

Schoolcraft College's men's basketball team, short on numbers (only seven players left) and victories (none since November), lost at least one player to academic woes at the January semester break.

Bryant Markowicz, a 6-7 freshman from Dearborn Crestwood, did not make the necessary grades to remain eligible.

Also, freshman Courtney Williamson, the Ocelots' 6-5 starting power forward, was — as coach Dave Bogataj described it — "on the bubble." Williamson has a grade pending that, if it goes through as it is, will sideline him for the rest of the season, too.

Injuries and defections have already cost SC six players, putting a severe strain on the Ocelot bench.

Going into last Saturday's game against Alpena CC, SC had lost seven consecutive games and was 0-4 in Eastern Conference play.

SC WOMEN

SC's women's team hasn't done much better on the floor than the men's team — the

Lady Ocelots are also 0-4 in the conference after having lost three players to knee injuries — but they fared better in the classroom. Everyone on the team made grades.

Not that it helped them when they returned from the holiday break. SC traveled to Toledo to battle Owens Tech Jan. 3, and the outcome wasn't good: a 76-69 defeat.

The Lady Ocelots had their chances. They played what coach Jack Grenan called their best half of the season in the first half and led 47-40 at the break. But their shooter's touch abandoned them after that.

Still, SC was within 71-69 with 1:15 left and Dana Hudson was at the line, shooting a one-and-one. She missed. After that, a three-pointer by Hudson was disallowed when officials ruled it came after the shot clock expired.

Hudson finished with 27 points (20 in the first half) and 15 rebounds. Alyssa Wechter scored 14 points and grabbed eight boards, and Becky Piotruski had 12 points (all in the first half).

The loss left SC at 6-8 for the season.
