The All-Star Bowlerettes, now making their home at Cloverlane in Livonia on Mondays at 8:30 p.m., have distinguished themselves both locally and nationally. Back in the featured such all-time greats as Agnes Eckstrom, Helen Shabilla, Connie Pappas, Ethel Hansen, Dorothy Alfred, Helen Baker, Maxine Cruchon, Anita Cantelline and Elvira Tepper, most of whom are in the WIBC or local hall of fame.

Among the present standouts are Alita Sill and Cheryl Daniels, both of whom have been standout performers on the ladies pro bowlers tour. Some of the lesser known bowlers have also competed on the pro tour and among these are Lorene Ravanne, Dina Martin-Jones, Tina Barber of Westland, Patsy Wray, Sam Greaves, Laurie Soto and Tracie Harok.

Among their all-time records: high team average, season, shared by Bonanza Restaurants (80-81) and Goebel Beer (86-89) with 993; High individual average, season, was Alita Sill (87-88) with 213.

The new high team and series standards were broken this season as the Pro-Am Bowling & Trophy Sales team totaled 3,233 pins for a three-game series and team score for one game at 1,221 pins. Both are the highest in the nation so far this season.

They have 18 teams with a 5-bowler lineup, so any bowling fans and aficionados who would like to watch a lot of great bowling action every week are welcome to come out to Cloverlane on Schoolcraft across from the Detroit Race Course. Admission is free.

Speaking of Cloverlane, they are running a "Learn to Bowl" program for youth under the direction of Marilyn Luck and Darlene Marrow. Program No. 1 is for beginners and Program No. 2 for intermediates. Both programs will be offered on Wednesdays and Fridays starting the week of Jan. 18. Bumper bowling will also be available. Stevenson hoopers overcome Franklin

Chris Chichilla prefers assists over points, but host Livonia Stevenson needed his scoring Friday in a 69-60 boys basketball win over city rival Franklin.

Chichilla, a burly 6-foot-3 transfer forward from Redford Catholic Central, scored the game-high 28 points to lead the Spartans to victory in the Western Lakes Activities Association opener for both schools.

"He's doing a nice job at the spot he's at because he handles the ball at the high post," Stevenson coach Jim McIntyre said. "And he's also a good passer, which is becoming a lost art. He's excellent when he creates with the pass. He thinks pass more than shoot."

Chichilla was the difference in a game which was tightly contested from nearly start to finish.

He scored 11 of his 28 in the final five minutes, coupled with a key steal with 1:31 to go, sealing the victory for the Spartans, now 3-2 overall.

"He (Chichilla) kept breaking into the lane and someone was supposed to pick him up," Franklin coach Dan Kennedy said. "In our 2-3 zone, the opposite guard is supposed to deny that pass, but he wasn't doing it."

"Chichilla just kept getting those five- to 10-footers, and kept knocking them down," Kennedy said. Chichilla, who credits former CC standouts Bobby Kummer (UNC-Charlotte) and Chad Varga (Richmond) for helping

develop his game, hit nine of 14 shots from the floor, including one three-pointer. He added nine of 11 free throws.

Adam Roy, a 6-3 senior center, added 15 points, while Brad Morgan and Steve Harrison contributed 10 and nine, respectively.

"It's really team concept," Chichilla said. "We move the ball around and get it to whoever is hot. When the person is hot, we get the ball to him. The last time it was Harrison. And Adam is nice to have because I can pass to him and dish off."

"It's fun for me to see other guys on the team score because everybody wins."

Stevenson's zone defense also had the Patriots misfiring from every angle.

The Patriots shot a dismal 26 percent from the floor (20 of 75) compared to Stevenson's 44 percent accuracy (22 of 50).

"We've been inconsistent so far," said Franklin first-year coach Dan Kennedy, whose team is 2-3 overall. "If the jumper is falling, we're loving life. If not, then it's clearly evident by the outcome tonight. We wanted to penetrate their zone, but when you're wide open, the temptation is too great to pass the shot. You just keep firing and hope the next one goes in."

Junior guard Clemente Herrera led the Patriots with 18 points, but shot only six of 20 from the floor. Greg Maple, also a junior, added 14, but made only four of 13. Paul Kuschka was next with 12, while connecting on just five of 15.

time Reenders was whistled for a charge, her fifth foul. She played just 29 of 45 minutes, totaling 12 points and 12 rebounds.

"It's unfortunate the officials decided the game," said Aquinas coach Pat Ribaldi. "We didn't play well enough to win, but we played without three starters for most of the game."

Without Reenders — and, as Ribaldi explained, "We're an interior team; we really don't shoot threes that much" — the Saints were forced to rely on Snider. She responded, scoring six of her team's 10 overtime points and 11 of its last 15. Snider finished with 36, making 7-of-13 three-pointers.

But there was no denying Madonna. After missing from the line with 1:37 remaining, Creley (who was 8-of-9) hit two with 1:10 left to increase Madonna's lead to 75-71.

Once again, the Saints battled back. Snider hit two free throws with 55 seconds left to narrow the lead to two, but she missed a three with 25 seconds left and Madonna rebounded, calling timeout. After the ball was inbounded to Dana Covech, Aquinas' Nikki Tuttle knocked it away, recovered it and scored to tie the game with 13 seconds to go.

Potter set up a play for Niebauer, who scored all of her team-high 16 points after half-time. Niebauer's long jumper rimmed out, but Creley rebounded and was fouled by Snider at the buzzer.

Creley finished with 10 points. Lori Montano and Jill Burt scored 11 apiece, with Chari Sanagregio and Mary Bieniewicz adding eight each.
